- Annual Bluegrass (Poa Annua): Although it flowers in the spring, seeds germinate in the fall, making fall and winter treatment with a pre-emergent herbicide a must. (An exception is Fescue lawns, which can be harmed by the treatment.)

 Minimize Bare Spots: Bare soil is an invitation to weeds. Seed bare spots in the lawn, and mulch trees, shrubs, and gardens.

Lawn Treatments

Weed Control

Your lawn was treated with both a pre-emergent to prevent crabgrass and many other grassy weeds and a post-emergent that will kill off existing broadleaf weeds over the next two weeks.

Fertilization

Our Arbor-Nomics Special Blend fertilizer nourishes turf during the growing season.

Fungus Control (if included in your program)

We applied a fungicide to help prevent brown patch and dollar spot, two common fungal diseases.

Pest Control (if included in your program)

We sprayed a protective barrier of our Outdoor Pest Control around your vard and in key breeding areas, such as ground cover, to control ants, fleas, ticks, and spiders.

Aeration (if included in your program) Aeration for lawns with warm-season grasses will be done during April and May.

Schedule Your Lawn Aeration.

Bermuda, Zoysia, and other warmseason grasses should be aerated each spring. If aeration is not a part of your program, you can purchase it as an addon service. Call us for a FREE estimate soon - we only aerate in April and May.

Don't Mow Too Short.

Avoid removing more than one-third of grass blades in a single cutting. And leave the clippings on the lawn so they can break down and add nutrients to the soil. It's okay to mow after we treat as long as the grass is dry to the touch.

Water Regularly

Between rain and irrigation, your lawn needs an inch of water each week. When watering, aim for early morning or late afternoon to minimize evaporation.
