WHAT YOU GNEED TO GNOW: FINN'S HELPFUL HINTS

WATER WISELY

Your lawn needs an inch of water each week. Two 30-minute sprinkler sessions should do the trick in the absence of April showers. Watering before 10 am or around 4 pm will help reduce evaporation.

LET YOUR FESCUE FLOURISH

Mow fescue lawns to about 3.5 to 4 inches in length to keep soil temps cool for this cool-season grass.

WEEKLY WATCHOUT

Check your lawn, trees, and shrubs weekly for discolored patches or signs of insect damage. Call us if you notice any troublesome spots, and let our pros take care of any potential woes.

MULCH FOR MOISTURE

Spread a 3-inch layer of mulch around the base of shrubs to help them retain moisture as spring temps start to rise.

GET YOUR LAWN SPRING-READY WITH AERATION

Your lawn's soil gets hard and compact during the winter. Spring aeration punches through the soil to help:

- Air, water, and nutrients reach your lawn's roots
- · Root systems grow deeper and stronger
- Lawns grow thicker, fuller, and more weed-resistant
